A BILL

To require that States that receive a grant under the Child Care and Development Block Grant Act of 1990, will not prohibit licensed child care providers from performing simple food preparation of fruits and vegetables.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*
2 *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

3 **SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.**

4 This Act may be cited as the “Cutting Red Tape on
5 Child Care Providers Act of 2025”.

6 **SEC. 2. FINDINGS.**

7 The Congress finds the following:

1 (1) Access to minimally processed fruits, vege-
2 tables, nuts and seeds is crucial for the development
3 and well-being of children.

4 (2) Licensed child care providers often face re-
5 strictions on food preparation that limit their ability
6 to serve fresh fruits and vegetables.

7 (3) Home and family based child care options,
8 (estimated to serve about $\frac{1}{4}$ of families), have seen
9 steady declines over the past decade. While this de-
10 creases child care choices for all families, it dis-
11 proportionately impacts low-income and rural fami-
12 lies and those requiring daycare at non-traditional
13 times because of shift work.

14 (4) Complicated and burdensome regulations
15 are more challenging for home-based providers and
16 are likely a part of the reason these centers are de-
17 clining.

18 (5) Current regulations can make it easier to
19 open a pre-packaged, often ultra-processed, snack
20 than it is to, for example, peel a banana. This un-
21 dermines the ability of child care providers to pro-
22 vide basic nutrition to our kids.

23 (6) Simplifying regulations to encourage simple
24 food preparation of minimally processed agricultural

1 products can improve nutritional outcomes for chil-
2 dren.

3 **SEC. 3. DEFINITIONS.**

4 For purposes of this Act and the amendment made
5 by this Act, the term “simple food preparation” means
6 the basic preparation of fruits and vegetables, including
7 washing, peeling, cutting, and serving raw or minimally
8 processed produce.

9 **SEC. 4. PROHIBITION OF BARRIERS UNDER THE CHILD**
10 **CARE AND DEVELOPMENT BLOCK GRANT**
11 **ACT OF 1990.**

12 Section 658E(c)(2)(F) of the Child Care and Devel-
13 opment Block Grant Act of 1990 (42 U.S.C. 9858c(2)(F))
14 is amended by adding at the end the following:

15 “(iii) PROHIBITION OF BARRIERS.—
16 The State shall not create any barriers on
17 the simple preparation of fresh fruits and
18 vegetables for facilities, licensed or licensed
19 exempt.”.
