A BILL

To amend the Public Works and Economic Development Act of 1965 with respect to the eligibility of youth sports facilities for certain grants, and for other purposes.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*
2 *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

3 **SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.**

4 This Act may be cited as the “Youth Sports Facilities
5 Act of 2025”.

1 **SEC. 2. YOUTH SPORTS FACILITY ELIGIBILITY.**

2 Section 201 of the Public Works and Economic De-
3 velopment Act of 1965 (42 U.S.C. 3141) is amended—

4 (1) in subsection (a)(1), by inserting “youth
5 sports,” after “public service,”;

6 (2) in subsection (b)(1)(A), by inserting “or
7 youth sports facilities” after “facilities”; and

8 (3) in subsection (c)—

9 (A) in paragraph (7), by striking “or” at
10 the end;

11 (B) in paragraph (8), by striking the pe-
12 riod at the end and inserting a semicolon; and

13 (C) by adding at the end the following:

14 “(9) address and mitigate the mental and phys-
15 ical health impacts of sedentary lifestyles and obe-
16 sity on the health of a community by improving ac-
17 cess to recreational space, including by developing
18 youth sports facilities serving the community;

19 “(10) benefit highly rural communities without
20 adequate tax revenues to invest in active lifestyle in-
21 frastructure;

22 “(11) primarily serve children who—

23 “(A) are from low-income families in rural
24 or underserved communities;

1 “(B) lack access to indoor or outdoor fa-
2 cilities for covered physical education and
3 sports activities; and

4 “(C) live or attend school in communities
5 with high rates of opioid use disorders or com-
6 munity violence;

7 “(12) support youth sports and recreation to
8 spur economic development, with a focus on urban
9 and rural communities lacking facilities; or

10 “(13) promote job creation through youth
11 sports facilities and adjacent businesses that support
12 such facilities.”.

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
