A BILL

To direct the Secretary of Defense to establish a strategic partnership with the Taiwan Ministry of National Defense to coordinate defense industrial priorities, expand defense technology cooperation, deter regional adversaries, and for other purposes.

2 *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

3 **SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.**

4 This Act may be cited as the “U.S.-Taiwan Defense
5 Innovation Partnership Act”.

1 **SEC. 2. STRATEGIC PARTNERSHIP ON DEFENSE INDUS-**
2 **TRIAL PRIORITIES BETWEEN THE UNITED**
3 **STATES AND TAIWAN.**

4 The Secretary of Defense shall seek to establish a
5 partnership between the Department of Defense and ap-
6 propriate counterparts of Taiwan in order to—

7 (1) enhance market opportunities for United
8 States-based and Taiwan-based defense technology
9 companies;

10 (2) bolster Taiwan’s defense industrial base;

11 (3) harmonize global security posture through
12 emerging technology;

13 (4) counter the Chinese Communist Party and
14 Chinese Communist Party-aligned adversarial proxy
15 group development of dual-use defense technologies;
16 and

17 (5) in coordination with appropriate counter-
18 part offices of the Taiwan Ministry of National De-
19 fense—

20 (A) enable coordination on defense indus-
21 trial priorities;

22 (B) streamline emerging defense tech-
23 nology research and development;

24 (C) create more pathways to market for
25 defense technology startups; and

- 1 (D) collaborate on the coordinated develop-
2 ment of dual-use defense capabilities, such as
3 the following:
- 4 (i) Drones.
 - 5 (ii) Microchips.
 - 6 (iii) Directed energy weapons.
 - 7 (iv) Artificial Intelligence.
 - 8 (v) Missile technology.
 - 9 (vi) Intelligence, surveillance, and re-
10 connaissance technology.

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
