A BILL

To award a Congressional Gold Medal to President Donald J. Trump, in recognition of his extraordinary peacemaking efforts throughout the world and in facilitating the Trump peace agreement to end the war in Gaza and bring lasting peace to the Middle East.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*
2 *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

1 **SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.**

2 This Act may be cited as the “Donald J. Trump Con-
3 gressional Gold Medal Act”.

4 **SEC. 2. FINDINGS.**

5 The Congress finds the following:

6 (1) In October 2025, President Donald J.
7 Trump negotiated and secured a historic peace
8 agreement between the State of Israel and Hamas.

9 (2) This agreement brought an end to long-
10 standing hostilities, normalized diplomatic relations,
11 and laid a foundation for regional stability, economic
12 cooperation, and mutual recognition.

13 (3) President Trump’s diplomatic efforts, perse-
14 verance, and vision contributed significantly to an
15 unprecedented breakthrough in Middle East peace
16 efforts.

17 (4) The October 2025 Peace Agreement has
18 been internationally recognized as a major advance-
19 ment in global diplomacy and U.S. leadership in con-
20 flict resolution.

21 (5) President Trump has negotiated peace
22 throughout the world.

23 (A) On August 8, 2025, Armenia and
24 Azerbaijan and President Trump signed a peace
25 agreement at the White House ending a dec-
26 ades-long war.

1 (B) On June 20, 2025, President Trump
2 announced a peace agreement between the
3 Democratic Republic of Congo and Rwanda,
4 crediting Secretary of State Marco Rubio for
5 helping to bring them together.

6 (C) On June 23, 2025, President Trump
7 announced he had negotiated a ceasefire be-
8 tween Iran and Israel.

9 (D) On May 12, 2025, after U.S. led talks,
10 President Trump announced that India and
11 Pakistan had reached a ceasefire after an inten-
12 sifying military confrontation.

13 (E) On July 28, 2025, leaders of Cam-
14 bodia and Thailand agreed to a ceasefire after
15 five deadly days of fighting. President Trump
16 leveraged trade deals with the United States to
17 ensure this ceasefire was negotiated and agreed
18 upon.

19 (F) On June 15, 2025, President Trump
20 brokered a deal between Egypt and Ethiopia to
21 pause a conflict over the effects of a dam on the
22 Nile River.

23 (G) In his first term, President Trump ne-
24 gotiated an economic normalization between
25 Kosovo and Serbia.

1 (6) The Congress recognizes the importance of
2 honoring such exceptional achievement in foreign
3 policy and peacemaking.

4 **SEC. 3. CONGRESSIONAL GOLD MEDAL.**

5 (a) PRESENTATION AUTHORIZED.—The Speaker of
6 the House of Representatives and the President pro tem-
7 pore of the Senate shall make appropriate arrangements
8 for the presentation, on behalf of the Congress, of a gold
9 medal of appropriate design in commemoration to Presi-
10 dent Donald J. Trump, in recognition of his extraordinary
11 peacemaking efforts throughout the world and in facili-
12 tating the Trump peace agreement to end the war in Gaza
13 and bring lasting peace to the Middle East.

14 (b) DESIGN AND STRIKING.—For purposes of the
15 presentation referred to in subsection (a), the Secretary
16 of the Treasury (referred to in this Act as the “Sec-
17 retary”) shall strike a gold medal with suitable emblems,
18 devices, and inscriptions, to be determined by the Sec-
19 retary.

20 **SEC. 4. DUPLICATE MEDALS.**

21 The Secretary may strike and sell duplicates in
22 bronze of the gold medal struck pursuant to section 3
23 under such regulations as the Secretary may prescribe, at
24 a price sufficient to cover the cost thereof, including labor,
25 materials, dies, use of machinery, and overhead expenses.

1 **SEC. 5. STATUS OF MEDALS.**

2 (a) NATIONAL MEDALS.—The medals struck pursu-
3 ant to this Act are national medals for purposes of chapter
4 51 of title 31, United States Code.

5 (b) NUMISMATIC ITEMS.—For purposes of sections
6 5134 and 5136 of title 31, United States Code, all medals
7 struck under this Act shall be considered to be numismatic
8 items.

9 **SEC. 6. AUTHORITY TO USE FUND AMOUNTS; PROCEEDS OF**
10 **SALE.**

11 (a) AUTHORITY TO USE FUND AMOUNTS.—There is
12 authorized to be charged against the United States Mint
13 Public Enterprise Fund such amounts as may be nec-
14 essary to pay for the costs of the medals struck pursuant
15 to this Act.

16 (b) PROCEEDS OF SALE.—Amounts received from the
17 sale of duplicate bronze medals authorized under this Act
18 shall be deposited into the United States Mint Public En-
19 terprise Fund.

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
