Mr. COTTON (for himself and Mr. BANKS) introduced the following bill; which was read twice and referred to the Committee on the Judiciary

A BILL

To subject aliens convicted of certain crimes to expedited removal from the United States.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*
2 *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

3 **SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.**

4 This Act may be cited as the “No Visas for Violent
5 Criminals Act”.

6 **SEC. 2. IMMIGRATION CONSEQUENCES FOR UNLAWFUL**
7 **PROTEST-RELATED ACTIVITIES.**

8 (a) IN GENERAL.—Section 237(a)(2) of the Immi-
9 gration and Nationality Act (8 U.S.C. 1227(a)(2)) is
10 amended by adding at the end the following:

1 “(G) UNLAWFUL PROTEST-RELATED AC-
 2 TIVITIES.—Any alien who is convicted of a
 3 crime—

4 “(i) related to the alien’s conduct at
 5 and during the course of a protest;

6 “(ii) involving the defacement, van-
 7 dalism, or destruction of Federal property;
 8 or

9 “(iii) involving the intentional obstruc-
 10 tion of any highway, road, bridge, or tun-
 11 nel,
 12 is deportable.”.

13 (b) CANCELLATION OF VISA; REMOVAL.—If any alien
 14 is convicted of a deportable crime described in section
 15 237(a) of the Immigration and Nationality Act, as amend-
 16 ed by subsection (a)—

17 (1) any visa issued to such alien shall imme-
 18 diately be cancelled; and

19 (2) not later than 60 days after such conviction,
 20 such alien shall be removed from the United States.

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
