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## A BILL

To direct the Secretary of Health and Human Services to conduct, and submit to Congress a report describing the results of, a study on the use of home cardiorespiratory monitors for infants, and for other purposes.

1       *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*  
2       *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

### 3   **SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.**

4       This Act may be cited as the “Baby Observation Act”  
5   or the “BO’s Act”.

1 **SEC. 2. STUDY AND REPORT ON HOME CARDIORESPIRA-**  
2 **TORY MONITORS FOR INFANTS.**

3 (a) STUDY.—The Secretary of Health and Human  
4 Services (in this section referred to as the “Secretary”),  
5 pursuant to section 1121(a) of the Public Health Service  
6 Act (42 U.S.C. 300c–11(a)), shall conduct a study on the  
7 use of home cardiorespiratory monitors for infants in rela-  
8 tion to the prevention of sudden unexpected infant death  
9 (as defined in section 1121(e) of such Act (42 U.S.C.  
10 300c–11(e))).

11 (b) REPORT.—Not later than 1 year after the date  
12 of enactment of this Act, the Secretary shall submit to  
13 Congress a report describing the results of the study under  
14 subsection (a). Such report shall include the following:

15 (1) Evidence on the effectiveness, performance,  
16 and accuracy of home cardiorespiratory monitors  
17 that track the heart rate, blood oxygen levels, and  
18 other vital signs of an infant, particularly those in-  
19 fants who are high-risk.

20 (2) New models of care to improve the home  
21 sleeping environment of an infant, including the use  
22 of cardiorespiratory monitors.

23 (3) Health care plan criteria for medically ap-  
24 propriate coverage for a home cardiorespiratory  
25 monitor.

- 1           (4) Recommendations on whether home cardio-
- 2       respiratory monitors have shown product efficacy
- 3       supporting coverage under public or private health
- 4       insurance plans.

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
